How to Clean Quartz Countertops

Quartz countertops are manufactured to have a non-porous surface, meaning they do not have the tiny indents or ridges natural stone possesses. Having a solid surface seals it in, as well as provides protection from spills.

When cleaning Silestone quartz countertops, simply wipe with a combination of dish soap, warm water and a soft cloth. Using a microfiber cloth or non-abrasive sponge will gently clean the surface to remove any dirt or debris without scratching the finish. Wiping in small circles covers a wide area and completely removes any traces of dirt.

The <u>Silestone Quick Reference Guide</u> suggests performing regular cleanings whenever there is dirt or spill. Removing any dirt quickly will prevent any acidic material from damaging the quartz over time.

Removing Tough Messes on Quartz Countertops

Not every mess will be as easy as wiping away apple juice or crumbs from breakfast. According to the <u>Silestone Care & Maintenance Guide</u>, for tougher messes, soak the area for a few minutes with a mild household cleaner like Formula 409 or Windex. After letting the area saturate, rinse and clean with a soft brush or non-abrasive scouring pad.

Stains or messes that harden over time like gum will require some extra force to remove. Using a blade or putty knife, carefully scrape off the surface and clean with dish soap and warm water. Quartz is very durable and scratch resistant, but use caution when handling sharp objects.

What Not to Use on Quartz Countertops

Quartz may be strong, but it is not invulnerable. It can be damaged if cleaned with the incorrect products.

Harsh Chemicals: Strong chemicals using bleach have high acidity levels which are very harsh on countertops. Continual cleaning with bleach cleaners or other acidic cleaners will lead to discoloration or damage over time.

Water Repellents and Sealants: Quartz is already sealed because it is manufactured to have a solid surface. Using a sealant will be redundant, wastes your time and money, as well as damage the quartz. Quartz can actually lose its sheen when these products are applied.

Rough Scrubbing Pads: The hard scraping action when using a rough scrubbing pad can remove the sheen on quartz.

High pH Cleaners: Home cleaners which have a high pH are also very acidic and can damage quartz countertops. Products such as degreasers, oven cleaners, and alkaline cleaning solutions all have high pH levels and should not be used to clean quartz countertops.

How to Prevent Stains on Quartz Countertops

All this just means that it is very difficult to stain or damage quartz. Still, prevention is always better than reacting, and it is better to be proactive when managing your quartz countertops.

Wipe up any spills or messes before it sticks onto the stone. It is very difficult for anything to soak into quartz because it is dense with almost no chance of anything seeping into any cracks.

Performing daily care by cleaning the surface with warm water, dish soap and a soft cloth is more than
enough to keep quartz healthy.
