We can sing the praises of granite stone for an entire article. Granite is resilient, durable, easy to maintain, and one of the few natural stones which can be good for indoor or outdoor use.

For better context, natural stone is rated on the Mohs hardness scale to determine how hard the stone is. Granite has an excellent hardness of ranking 8 out of 10. This means granite is hard enough to withstand most damage from wear, tear, and widespread use at home. The only minor flaw that can be made with granite would be that it is porous and needs to be sealed. But that is less of a weakness and more of a broad quality of natural stone as marble, quartzite, onyx, and other stones are just as or more porous. In comparison, granite is much hardier than other stones and it is a clear favorite with homeowners in regard to overall practicality.

Colors of Granite

What color do you want your cabinets to look like? A simple question on the surface but has multiple layers of meaning when you really think and understand what each color truly means for interior design.

As granite comes in multiple colors and patterns, we will go over the most popular colors for granite.

White

White granite stones like <u>Sea Pearl</u> and <u>River White</u> are associated with simplicity, peace, open space, and a clean environment. They are excellent for homes that want to present a sterile or clean space the moment you look in.

Black

Black granite like <u>Black Galaxy</u> and <u>Atlantic Black</u> are associated with elegance, formality, power, and depth. Black granite is perfect to provide negative space, allowing other objects like cabinets, backsplash, or other focal points to capture your attention.

Gray

Gray granite like <u>Aspen White</u> and <u>Costa Esmeralda</u> are associated with neutrality, sophistication, urbanization, and practicality. Gray granite stone has been increasing in popularity as homeowners are looking for colors that feel like they are living in the city or look like urban concrete.

Beige

Beige granite like <u>Astoria</u> and <u>Bianco Romano</u> are associated with warmth, love, peace, and calm. Beige granite is great for homes that want to make their kitchens feel loving and lived in space. An area where you feel safe and comfortable, providing you with warm feelings like going on vacation to visit grandma and grampa in the country.

Blue

Blue granite like <u>Van Gogh</u> and <u>Blue Bahia</u> are more complex. Blue granite stones are typically not one uniform color, but a combination of other colors drawn together for delightful pieces of artwork for all to see.

Red

Red granite like <u>Colombo Gold</u> and <u>Sunset Red</u> are associated with passion, earth, strength, energy, and intensity. Red and brown granite can look very similar to each other and work best when incorporated in a room with earthy tones and atmosphere.

Textures of Cabinets

Cabinets are much easier to understand because they do not have as many color options. This is primarily due to the materials of what cabinets are made from. While cabinets can be painted or designed to have different colors, custom designs will be extremely expensive. Wood

Stainless Steel

Monochromatic colors are singular colors. It is easy to remember since mono means one. For example, white granite countertops will look good with white cabinets. Even if they are different shades, the colors are still similar enough that they will combine together to feel like a single room.

Monochromatic colors can work with every color, red granite and red oak cabinets, black granite and black laminate cabinets, gray granite with stainless steel cabinets, etc.

Opposite Colors

Colors on the opposite sides of the color wheel or spectrum are some of the most popular color combinations for design. The most recognizable complementary colors are red and blue or black and white. While both colors look great on their own, combining them together makes an aesthetically pleasing clash of opposition.

Try applying black granite countertops with white wood or laminate cabinets. This style is widely used in minimalist and modern interior design schemes because they create a clear separation of sections while providing proper space for both objects to shine.
