What Are My Stone Backsplash Options?

If you are looking to install a stone backsplash, you will have several material options to choose from. Your material options include:

 - Slate
 - Limestone
 - Travertine
 - Onyx

The following is an analysis of each option.

Granite

<u>Granite</u> is one of the most durable natural stones that you can find. It is the most popular backsplash material, as well as the most popular for countertops. You will be able to find granite in many different colors, so you can either match your countertop or go for a contrasting look. Because of the stone's strength, granite is a logical choice for a kitchen backsplash.

Marble

Marble is another very popular stone backsplash material. The stone's elegant veining will increase the beauty of any room you use it in. <u>Marble</u> can also be found in many different colors. Because it is not quite as strong as granite, marble is more commonly used as a backsplash in the bathroom.

Soapstone

One of the main advantages of <u>soapstone</u> is that it is not porous – a characteristic that you typically will not see in natural stones. Because of this, soapstone would be an excellent choice for either the kitchen or the bathroom. Soapstone can be found in various shades of gray, some of which have hints of green or blue.

Slate

If you are looking for a stone that has a uniform look, <u>slate</u> is the ideal choice for you. The stone typically comes in various shades of gray, which works well as a neutral color in any room. Something to note about slate is that you can also use it outdoors. It will be a perfect addition to your outdoor cooking area.

Limestone

Despite not being the strongest stone, there is no denying that limestone backsplashes look quite impressive. If you are willing to put in the effort to be careful around the material, a <u>limestone</u> backsplash can work for you. You can find limestone in a variety of colors, ranging from dark gray to light gold.

Travertine

<u>Travertine</u> is a form of limestone, so many of the properties listed above for limestone also hold true for travertine. Although you will have to exercise the proper amount of caution, if you take care of it, travertine is a very attractive material for a stone backsplash.

Onyx

If you are looking for something that will really catch attention, consider using onyx. The stone is on the pricier side, but if you want something that is truly stunning, there are few materials that can surpass <u>onyx</u>. As with limestone and travertine, you will have to be very careful. However, if you have no problem with keeping up on maintenance, you will be well rewarded by choosing onyx.

In addition to materials, you will have your choice of using tiles or the slab of stone. Tiles are much cheaper to use. If you choose to use part of the slab, you can use the same type of stone that your countertop has to create a uniform look.

Another choice you will make is how large you want your backsplash to be. You can either have it cover part of the wall, the entire wall space from the countertop up or even just a 4-inch backsplash.

The cost will vary between different types of stone backsplashes. A stone such as granite will be cheaper than many types of onyx.
